UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Schedule B of the Beacon Park Grading Bid Packet status – Schedule B will allow the installation of top soil and necessary seed to get the field ready for play. A sprinkler system will also be included. It will be U19 Soccer ready by spring of 2017 but will not be used until the fall to allow the grass to take root. Local Soccer Club is committed to \$10K (5K from the Club & 5K from a local family) and will continue to fund raise to attempt to raise the additional funds needed. Representatives of the Soccer Club were in attendance and are thankful the project is moving forward. The Club is requesting permission to sell sponsorship signs for the field as a fund raiser. The goal is, in time, to have a fully functional park with concessions stands, grandstands, permanent bathrooms, lights and trails. The club will have a fund raising committee and is requesting that donations be passed through the city so it doesn't affect the club's non-profit status. The city would then disperse the funds to the club as needed for projects. Mayor Samuel commended Becky Scott, Gerilynn Lindley and the soccer club for the many years of service and commitment. Councilman Cope also commended them for their service. Rocky Howard apprised the council that this will be a change order with Quiggs and they will start later in August.

Audit Costs – The State Auditor's Office has advised they are coming to audit the city later this month. The audit will include follow up on the 2015 exit interview with the city. This was not budgeted for so there will need to be a supplemental budget item to cover the approximately \$14,500 cost.

McBryde Culvert Project – Small project grant from Flood Authority (FH) with an August 12, 2016 deadline. The McBryde culvert is a tributary of Cedar Creek so is a FH grant eligible project. This is a shovel ready project at a projected cost from \$80K to \$90K. This will be submitted to the FH by the deadline and the submitted documents will be presented to the council for approval at the August 23, 2016 council meeting.

NEW BUSINESS:

Stop Signs – The Model Traffic Ordinance Committee met on August 27, 2016 regarding a request from the public for two additional stop signs at the intersection of East Simpson & North Satsop making it a 4-Way Stop. There has been an increase in traffic and visibility issues. The Mayor apprised the council that the City Attorney warns that by placing additional stop signs it exposes the city to liability. Motion to add two stop signs making it a 4-way stop at East Simpson and North Satsop was made by Trimble and seconded by Skaramuca. Motion Passed 6-0 Vote – Police Department will do educational enforcement.

Annexation proposal – Chuck Caldwell is representing Paul Willis in a single petitioner annexation request of 20 acres adjacent to City's Beacon Park property. Instructions have been request of the City Attorney. The County Boundary Review is not required because it abuts the city limits. A public hearing will be necessary. The Council will receive a review packet before the next council meeting at which time it will be discussed further.

Fleet Park Memorial Project – Former Mayor Estes was unable to attend so this is tabled until the next meeting.

PRESENTATION: Mayor's Economic Plan – Mayor Samuel stated that the City funds have had stagnant funds for some time now with the primary sources being I) property taxes 2) City Forest and 3) retail sales tax. The City is fortunate to have a Forest as a source of income for water and its infrastructure. The City is at a do or die point and needs to bring jobs and promote current businesses. Streets and sidewalks are in need; the City has a 4K population but serves a 15K school and county seat population. She requested input from the Council.
